Cattleya diseases

In general, orchids are quite hardy and have few pests or diseases under optimal conditions. When diseases occur it is normally due to infection from one plant to another, often spread by the use of unsterilized tools. Most experts recommend disinfecting tools thoroughly between use on plants and for very valuable plants the use of surgical gloves so that no viruses are transmitted. For most growers, this is either too cumbersome or time-consuming to do. Using disposable razor blades is a recommended alternative for cutting or trimming plants and not too expensive for the average hobbyist.

The most common diseases in Cattleya Alliance plants are the rots: bacterial rot, black rot, and Botrytis flower rot. All of these rots are spread by spores and occur when conditions are very moist which are the conditions under which the orchids are grown. Good air circulation and careful watering will reduce the incidence of these problems. Make sure that when misting is used that the plants have time to completely dry before night time.

Bacterial soft rot (Erwinia) shows up as soft brownish watery spots on the leaves. It is often caused by overhead watering or misting and can spread from plant to plant as water drips from overhead plants to those below. Cut out infected areas and spray with a bactericide. Increase air circulation or move the plant to an area which receives more air.

Black rot is a particularly virulent infection and if you notice black areas, especially on new growth, it is imperative that you act quickly or the plant may die -- sometimes in only a week. This rot most often occurs from the bottom of the pseudobulb and moves upward. Cut the plant back to healthy green growth and spray with a bactericide as soon as you are able to tend to the plant. It is recommended that you continue to spray on a weekly basis for a couple of weeks since the bacteria grow in the media also. If possible, transplant the plant and drench the entire plant in bactericide as you do so.

Botrytis flower spot shows as small light brown spots on flowers. Infected flowers should be removed and disposed of outside the growing area as soon as the problem occurs so that the spores will not spread to other plants and flowers. Remove any plant debris or spent flowers in the growing area as these are places where the spores grow.

Good sanitation practices, careful watering practices and adequate air circulation will keep these problems to a minimum. If you do notice any of these problems immediate action will allow you to keep your plants healthy.
