From our recipe corner, here is one for homemade insecticidal soap: Just add 1½ teaspoons of 'Murphy Oil Soap' in a quart-

size spray bottle. (Oil soap is the basic ingredient in store-bought insecticidal soap sprays. Don't use dishwashing soaps that contain detergent. It can damage your plants).

- 3. **Equitant/Variegata Oncidium Breeding and Culture**. Discussion of major species, early and complex hybrids and culture. 50 minutes.
- 4. **Orchids Everyone Should Krow**. Favorite orchids with emphasis on cultural techniques and trends to be aware of. 50 minutes.
- 4. **Development of Small Growing Cattleyas (minicatts).** Emphasis on Sc. Beaufort hybrids. Minicatts, history, examples Slc. Tiny Titan and others, culture. 45 minutes.
- 5. **Culture, Mixes and Potting Seminar.** No holds barred presentation on experiences in growing for nearly 40 years. Do's, don'ts, potting techniques and whatever, selection and use of materials. Have not gotten away with under 90 minutes on this one.
- 7. **Principles of Show Table Judging, Show Judging and AOS Judging**. Discussions of all aspects of Judging with emphasis on differences of each type. Requires at least a fifty plant show table for demonstrations. 60 80 minutes.
- 8 **Principles of Orchid Exhibits.** Discussions on acquisition of plants, preparation, installation, props, placement of plants, labeling with analysis of balance, rhythm, symmetry, color coordination, movement and positive and negative spaces. Slides showing examples of exhibits and principles. 50 minutes.
- 9. **Miltoniopsis.** Discussion of species. Historical references. Early hybrids and derivation of colors and forms of new hybrids. Culture.

Larger than normal white vanilla fragrant flowers with long nectarary. \$18.00 Ornitocephalus gladiatus and inflexous. Cork mtd. downward growing fan(s) producing multiple inflorescences of green and white 1/4" flowers. Both great for specimen culture. \$20.00@ Orstedella (Epi.) centradenia 'Alice' CBM/AOS. Miniature reed stem. Clusters of long lasting ¾" pink flowers. Cork mounted and will form dense matts of growth into specimens. A division took Best in Show at NY in 2003. Polyrhizza lindenii. The Ghost Orchid - seedlings. To flower in one to two years. Plants spread from 3 - 5". Growing in Spanish Moss. (3). \$40.00 Tolumnia (Oncidium) variegata. Selected vigorous equitant variety, quality flowers, multi-growth mounted on cork. \$15.00 (Onc. Robsan x Onc. Lindsey Kone). Got this great plant a few years ago. Vigoruos, small cluster grower with outstanding yellow w/oxblood center. Just divided - mtd. On cork. (3) Encyclia cochleata 'Spyhill' AM/AOS. The black octopus/cockleshell. One of the best cochleatas. Small flowering sized divisions. Normally \$100.00: (2) \$45.00 C. skinneri alba 'Debbie' FCC/AOS. This is a beauty. (1) 4 ½", (1) 5". Flwrg. Size. \$45.00 Brassavola Little Stars' Rene' (previous CCM/AOS). So you say, what's so good about a Little Stars? Well how about 392, 5" perfectly formed flowers, on 87 inflorescences. Divided the beast and have a half dozen plants available happily taking off in 4 ½ - 5" pots. Paph. Angela (P. niveum x P. fairrieanum). Select Paph., easy to grow and flower, often with two flowers. Charming white 2 ½" flowers with maroon speckling and stripes. (3) Miltonia Overlook 'Russian River' (M. Bluntii x M. Anne Warne). Selected on a trip to the West Coast. Warm growing controlled weed that forms specimens - quickly forms masses of growth and flowers.

Encyclia radiata 'Shira' HCC/AOS. Collected by my friend Jules Ellison in Guatemala. Spectacular for the species. Much fuller flowers than normal and producing up to 20 fragrant flowers per inflorescence. Very special. (1) 4" \$50.00

Pinelands One Time Special. Tiny Titans are some of the highest and most consistently awarded minicatts ever. The Tangerine Glow is a 2 ¾" orange with a red lip. Very vigorous and can flower three times per year. Sentinel sells these for up to \$300 per plant. (3) @ \$75.00

New Seedlings. These seedlings have been growing at Sentinel for at least two years, some three. Wimps are discarded. Only the fittest are maintained.

Blc. Goldenzelle 'Prelude'. (Blc. Fortune x C. Horace). Cream with peach overlay. Mericlone in 3 - 3 ½" pots. Vigoruos - limited. 4 ½ - 5" near flowering. \$25.00

Blc. Goldenzelle ('Promised Land' x 'Symphony'). Sibling lavender by orange in 3 - 3 ½" pots. \$18.00

DiacattleyaChantilly Lace 'Twinkle' (C. El dorado Splash x Diac. Bicornutum). Soft pink 2" flowers with beautiful lavender splotch and spotted lip and mimicked perfectly on the petals. Small blooming sized

C. aurantiaca ('Johns Orange Jewel' AM/AOS x self). Blooming sized seedlings. Orange clusters in the species form, not the fake fat aurantiacas with shots of skinneri. (2) 3". \$18.00

Broughtonia Species & Hybrids

Broughtonia negrilensis. Several Sentinel crosses utilizing - 'Sentinel' JC/AOS, 'Moose' HCC/AOS, & 'H.W.'

Flowers in Spring with branching inflorescences of tubular 2" pink flowers with darker pink lips with extra-ordinary purple markings. Very vigorous plants. Many of the seedlings are

producing flowers as good or better than the awarded parents. Slabbed. Extremely high quality. \$40.00

Broughtonia Seagulls Jamaica (Jamaicensis). (Broughtonia sanguinea x Broughtonia negrilensis): This Sentinel cross has been a real surprise. Negrilensis sized flowers flattened by the sanguinea with medium to dark pink and bicolor coloration with intense dark purple lip markings. Slabbed. \$40.00

Epicatonia Jamaica Jem 'Sentinel II' HCC/AOS. (Ctna. Jamaica Red x Psychillis atropurpureaa). Superior breeding. 28" tall inflorescences with cluster of up to 16 red 2 1/2" flowers. Looks like a large open Jamaica red. Broad flat lip. Chunky plants only 10" in height with broad leaves. Ideal for specimen culture. As plants get fuller, they produce branching spikes. Generally in flower for minimum 4 months a year.

Lioponia Kingston alba 'Moonbeam'. Laeliopsis domingensis x Broughtonia sanguinea aurea). Long inflorescences with many 2" pure white flowers with open tubular lips with yellow centers. Ctna. Jamaica Red 'Sentinel' HCC/AOS (Ctna. Keith Roth x Broughtonia sanguinea). Sentinel has flowered probably twenty five Jamaica Reds. We selected and maintain what we consider the best in existence. Our plants produce award quality flowers on very large branched inflorescences. These are divisions, not mericlones. Very vigorous plants with clusters of 1 3/4" flowers normally \$100.00. Special: \$40.00

Ctna. Alina Froelich 'Carl' (Ctna. Rosey Jewel x Bro. sanguinea). A hybrid from 1973. Still one of best. 2" flat pink flowers in cluster. Easy to grow. 3" (1). \$20.00 SENFLA05LIST1.doc
